I think the decision to carve Trinity Ward from Stroud District has no logical basis. It was part of the development of The Field estate, as a new suburb, by William Cowle, a member of the Stroud Local Board of Health, in 1873. He donated the land for Stroud General Hospital to be built. The town cemetery is in that area. Holy Trinity church is part of Stroud parish community. The focus of residents and industries is towards Stroud, not Bisley or Painswick. Please show some common sense! This is a ridiculous solution to a numerical problem.

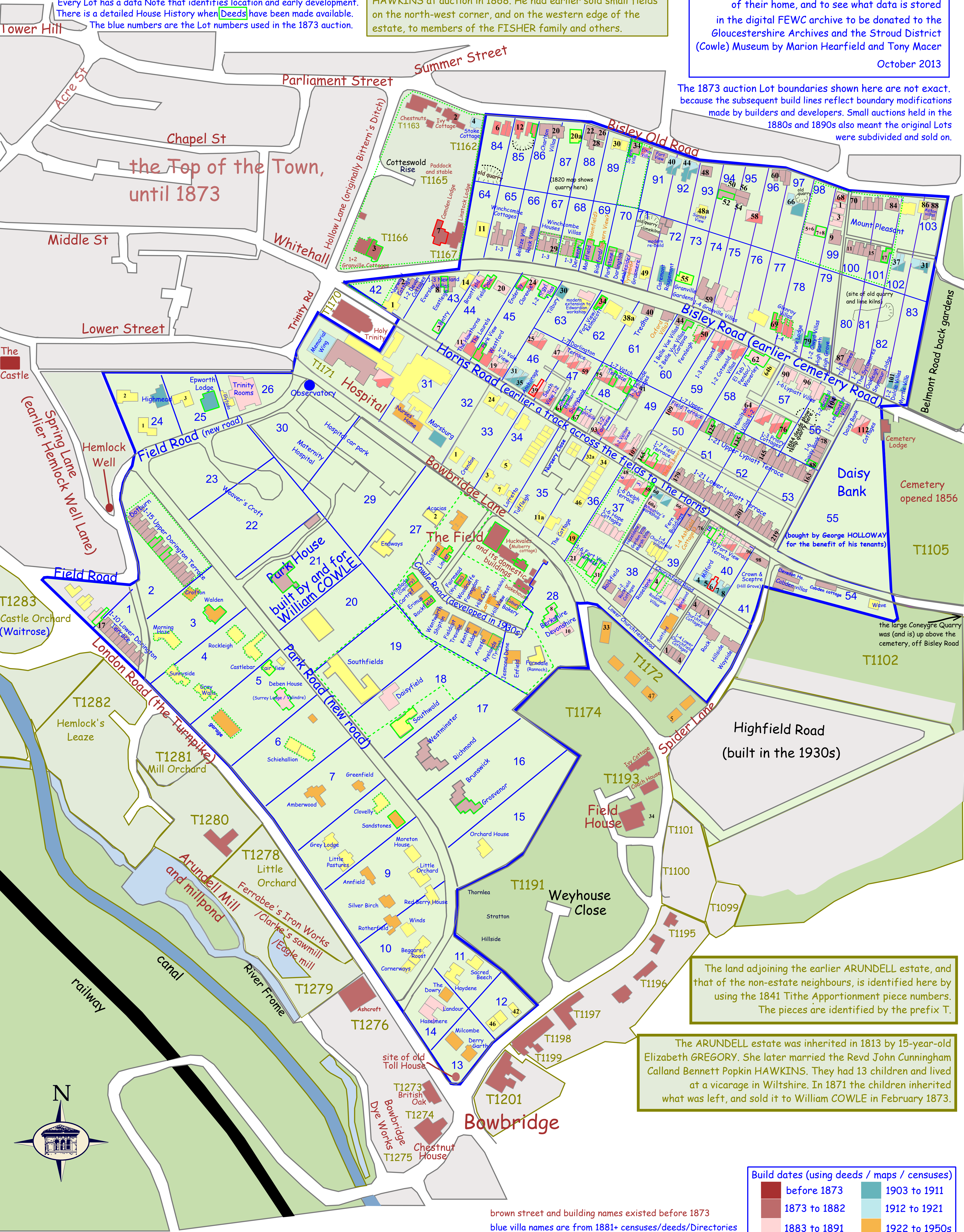
The Field Estate of William Cowle and its development between 1873 and the 1950s

Every Lot has a data Note that identifies location and early development. There is a detailed House History when Deeds have been made available. The blue numbers are the Lot numbers used in the 1873 auction.

The 1841 Tithe map shows the full extent the land inherited in 1813 from the ARUNDELL estate. The mill, and land between the turnpike and the river, were sold off by the Revd JCCBP HAWKINS at auction in 1868. He had earlier sold small fields on the north-west corner, and on the western edge of the estate, to members of the FISHER family and others.

The purpose of this digital multi-layer map is to enable researchers and residents to identify which 1873 building Lot is the site of their home, and to see what data is stored in the digital FEWC archive to be donated to the Gloucestershire Archives and the Stroud District (Cowle) Museum by Marion Hearfield and Tony Macer

The 1873 auction Lot boundaries shown here are not exact, because the subsequent build lines reflect boundary modifications made by builders and developers. Small auctions held in the 1880s and 1890s also meant the original Lots were subdivided and sold on.
